Dear Parents and Carers,

## Re: Awarding of A level Grades summer 2020

I am writing to you to advise that an updated version of the process for awarding A-level grades for 2020 is now available on the academy website and to share with you the process that teaching staff will use to determine the centre assessed grades for your child. The centre assessed grade is the grade which the academy will submit to the examination board for every student for every subject they study at A-level. The centre assessed grade IS NOT guaranteed to be the final grade the examination board awards to your child in August 2020.

I would also like to assure parents and carers that all steps in the process are in accordance with the guidelines issued by Ofqual in order to determine 'the most likely grade a student would have achieved if they had sat their exams this summer and completed any non-exam assessment.'

The process staff will use to determine the centre assessed grades for your child are as follows:

	Action	Justification
1	Mock Examination Each student's mock examination result (February 2020), in each subject they study, is used as the starting point for their final grade in each subject.	The mock assessments comprised of multiple papers taken under examination conditions. The papers were marked, standardised and moderated under a controlled process by Mossbourne Community Academy teaching staff.  The assessments represent the most reliable set of data for all students.
2	Calculated Grade The next step is the application of the average raw mark increase, between the February 2020 mock examination outcomes to final A level outcomes, based on the 2018/19 cohort. This produces a calculated grade for each pupil in each subject they study.  For example, in 2019, students who achieved grade C in the mock examination for A-level Biology gained an average increase of 10 raw marks in the final A-level examination.  Teaching staff will, therefore, add 10 raw marks to the results of students who achieved grade C in the A-level Biology, February 2020, mock examination to produce a calculated grade for A-level Biology.	Schools have been informed that the grades submitted to examination boards will be compared to their performance in last year's examinations as part of this process.
3	Centre Assessed Grade* The calculated grade for each student will be discussed and considered in video meetings between classroom teachers and managers. Further evidence will be considered to produce a centre assessed grade.  *The centre assessed grade is the grade which is submitted to the examination boards.	The Ofqual guidance clearly states that schools take into account a range of evidence in awarding a centre assessed grade. This includes other assessment results, standard of coursework (complete or non-complete), previous examination results in that subject, standard of classwork and homework tasks amongst others stated in the Ofqual guidance.



4	Centre Assessed Grade The centre assessed grades for each student is subject to a review meeting between the Head of Department, Head of Learning Area and the Associate Vice-Principals for assessment (MCA & MVPA). The Principal of the relevant academy and the Chief Executive Officer of the Mossbourne Federation may also be part of this panel.	This is to ensure the evidence used to adjust a grade up or down is present and has been applied fairly.
5	Rank Order of Pupils based on Centre Assessed Grades  Students are placed in rank order based on the centre assessed grade they are awarded. The most secure pupil within a grade is ranked '1'. As in all other years, rank order will not be reported on the examination certificate.  For example, a student may be awarded 'B/3' in English Literature. The 'B' denotes the centre assessed grade and the '3' denotes the fact that the pupil is the third most secure grade B within the cohort of pupils who are assessed as grade B. On the student's examination certificate, a grade B will be awarded if the examination board determine this is the student's final grade.  For example, a student may be awarded 'A/5' in Spanish. The 'A' denotes the centre assessed grade and the '5' denotes the fact that the pupil is the fifth most secure grade A within the cohort of pupils who are assessed as grade A. On the student's examination certificate, a grade A will be awarded if the examination board determine this is the student's final grade.  Every student will receive a centre assessed grade and rank number, for every subject they study.  Only final grades will appear on examination certificates. The final grade will not be known by teaching staff until examination results are published on 13th August 2020.	The rank order is required by the examination boards so that in the case of grades being adjusted up/down students are identifiable.  Students cannot be given the same ranking. In the case of identical examination scores the ranking will be decided by the students' average GCSE score, then by the term 1 assessment mark, then by the October assessment mark. The use of numerical information in this way reduces the degree of bias in this process.
6	The final centre assessed grades and rank order will be signed off by the Head of Department, Head of Learning Area and teachers for each subject, and a final declaration for all results signed by the Head of Centre.	This is a legal requirement not only for this process, it has always been the case for previous examinations.

The Ofqual guidance states that schools must not, under any circumstances, share the centre assessed grades nor the rank order of students with parents, carers, external agencies or indeed the students themselves. Please do not contact teaching staff regarding this process as they are legally bound not to discuss this information.

## **Publication of results**

A-level results will be published on 13th August 2020. We will be contact parents and carers as soon as possible regarding arrangements for results days; any arrangements will be subject to the Covid-19 regulations in place at that time, so it is not possible to confirm arrangements at the time of writing.

Arrangements for appeals will be published by Ofqual and the examination boards prior to the results. The Ofqual guidance has stated that the grounds for appeals will be 'narrow and based on the application of the process'. I have shared the process with you to demonstrate the care taken to comply with legal requirements and to give assurance that all pupils are given the opportunity to achieve their most likely grade with objectivity and fairness.
