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Dear Parents and Carers,

Welcome to the 2023 summer edition of the Mossbournian.

I wish to thank all parents, carers and staff for your tireless support and guidance of our children and young adults this academic year. It has been a hugely successful year in which we have seen academy life return to normal and attendance reaching the high pre-pandemic rates. The symbiotic relationship between family and teachers - home and the academy - provides emotional and intellectual support for our young people and your support is both hugely appreciated and invaluable. This is a time to reflect on the inspirational achievements of Mossbournians over the past academic year - they are a credit to the academy, their families and themselves. Though I could fill these pages with stories of their success and experiences, I will highlight but a few in the name of brevity.

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As the summer break looms, Year 11 and 13 students will be keenly awaiting their results. Year 11 students, whose contributions to Mossbourne epitomise family and community, will be recognised at the Year 11 Gelebration Ball on Tuesday 11th July. I'm sure everyone is looking forward to a spectacular evening, on which to celebrate the end of their exams in style.

Exciting and impressive futures beckon for our outgoing Year 13 students: I am in awe of this talented year group who have received 25 offers from Oxbridge, six offers to study medicine and one offer to study veterinary science. What is most incredible is that the success rate of Year 13 applicants to Cambridge is 53% (against a national average of 16.6%) and a success rate of 30% to Oxford (compared to 13%, nationally). A record breaking 88% of this year's Year 13 have received an offer to a Russell Group university. A very special mention must go to Lucy

Sims of 13 Morley who has received an offer to study dance at the Trinity Laban Conservatoire of Music and Dance – one of the most selective schools in the whole of the UK and Europe which has an acceptance rate of just 9.9%. Lucy is only the fourth Mossbournian to receive an offer from Trinity Laban Conservatoire and I wish Lucy, and all of her peers in Year 13 and Year 11, the very best of luck.

The Year 12 Grocers' Academy Awards team, who entered and won £5000 in a Dragons' Den style competition in November, went on to present at Mansion House in front of the Lord Mayor of London and over 200 delegates. For the very first time, the Mossbourne Sixth Form won the Livery Academy

from UCL, 'British Party Politics Since 1945' by Dr Mitya Pearson from Kings College London, 'Writing about Sports and Working with Marcus Rashford' by journalist and broadcaster, Carl Anka, and 'Discrimination, the Law and Human Rights' by Nichola Braganza, KC.

Sporting achievements have gone from strength to strength under the leadership of Ms Yennaris. I am very proud to report that Mossbourne won the Hackney Netball League in every year group, with many finals seeing our A and B teams competing against each other. 
A Mossbournian **Author**

News from the Combined Cadet Force

During the February half-term break, Mossbourne's Combined Cadet Force (CCF) held a two-day training camp at MCA. Cadets from both MCA and MVPA trained in the subjects of Drill and Turnout, Military Knowledge, and Skill at Arms, while the advanced level cadets attended the Junior Non-Commissioned Officer training course.

This was followed by a Navigation Exercise where, after learning how to use four and six-figure grid references and to calculate distances on both a map and the ground, cadets were challenged to navigate a 3.3km route around Victoria Park. The 33 cadets all successfully followed the set route, testing their ability to locate their position on a map, measure the distance walked, and navigate using the concepts of "handrails", "catching features" and "collecting features".

In April, five senior cadets took part in the annual London District Regional First Aid Competition. In addition to the CCF,

other organisations represented at the competition included the Army Cadet Force, the Volunteer Police Cadets, the London Fire Brigade Cadets, the St John Ambulance Cadets, and the Sea Cadet Corps.

The competition consisted of a series of scenario-based tests involving different medical emergencies with multiple casualties. Competitors were required to apply their first aid skills to treat the casualties and obtain help, handling the situation as realistically as possible. The Mossbourne cadets were awarded Regional First Aid Badges and gained valuable experience for next year's competition.

At the end of training on Coronation Day, Saturday 6th May, Mossbourne cadets formed up on the viewing roof at MCA to watch the Royal Salute flypast by the Royal Air Force and offered their own 'three cheers' to His Majesty The King. ■

Swimming for Charity

During spring term **Fulgis Luyeye** (12 Berkoff) took part in a swimathon to raise money for cancer research. Here she recounts her experience:

On the 14th of May I was fortunate enough to be able to swim a swimathon which was raising money for Cancer Research UK and Marie Curie. To date we've raised over £850,000. I originally got involved with the swimathon through BADU Sports. I started training about two months prior to the event and I was swimming every Tuesday with BADU for about an hour and a half. On the day of the event, I arrived at Britannia Leisure Centre for 9.45am. My team of four swimmers had to swim 1.5k of which I swam 17 lengths. Afterwards I was a bit achy but really proud of what I and my teammates had achieved.

Upon doing further research about cancer to prepare me for the swimathon, I have found out that the risk of getting cancer is 50%. By doing events such as a swimathon, triathlon or marathon you can really help not just cancer research but also research into other life-threatening diseases. Remember that anyone can help make a change in someone else's life; you don't need to do something as drastic as running a marathon or taking part in a swimathon, it can be as little as donating or even trying to raise awareness.

Medicine Bursary

The Medicine Bursary Programme wrapped up another successful year with a visit to the Imperial NHS Trust Simulation suite. This facility helps teach medical students and junior doctors how to carry out tricky medical procedures in a safe way. They use high-tech manikins that behave as a patient would (feeling pain, talking, sweating etc).

The thirty medicine bursary students ran through a scenario where a patient had a heart attack. The students responded with CPR and stabilised the patient, with one student acting as team leader. The patient was then taken for a procedure that involved placing a stent into the heart valve – each student had an opportunity to undertake this. As it was such a big group, they were split into two. While one group worked through the heart attack scenario the other group worked with two junior doctors – May Slivnik and Mayur Murali – who gave up their time to teach the students intubation and airways skills.

The visit to the simulation centre was always a highlight of the year and we were delighted to be able to return after a three-year gap. It marked the end of a rewarding year where we have had visits from experts in the world of medicine to speak to our students. These include Sean Lintern – Health Editor of the Sunday Times, Louise Ashley, – CEO of Homerton Healthcare NHS Trust, Dr Helgi Johannsson – Vice-President of the Royal College of Anaesthetists, and Dr Patrick French – one of the country's foremost HIV experts. We are very grateful to all who have given up their time for our students this year.

making sure the fair was a great success.
















Free books for students in Year 9 and 10



Museum visits

To finish the trip, we made our way to the Science Museum and watched "A Beautiful Planet". Although we hadn't learnt about outer space in geography, the film presented the beauty of earth from the atmosphere and was a great way to end a fascinating day.

Classics Enrichment Week

In January, students from across the academy took part in events to learn more about Latin and Classics.

Year 11 English students took part in 'English and Classics: Aiming for Top Grades' where they studied the classical allusions in Macbeth and considered how to use this knowledge to improve their analysis of the text.

A number of students from different year groups attended an Ancient Greek taster lesson to find out more about studying classical languages.

A pop-up museum in the library allowed students to learn about katabases - journeys to the underworld in classical literature, a theme that emerges in the texts students study at all levels - from The Odyssey in Year 7 up to The Aeneid in Year 13.

Students then discussed the similarities and differences between the classical and contemporary staging in their next lessons.



Letters of Refuge

During the spring term, some Year 12 students travelled to King's College London to take part in a workshop and seminar. 'Letters of Refuge' introduced pupils to fragments of ancient letters, preserving the voices of people who lived under the Roman Empire. These were exhibited alongside contemporary letters written at Art Refuge's 'The Community Table' in Folkestone, Kent, and Calais, northern France by people who are displaced and seeking safety on either side of the English Channel. Pupils were able to write their own letters and discuss their thoughts with PhD students at the university.

KS3 trip to the British Museum and **London Mithraeum**

In June, Latin pupils in Year 8 and Year 9 visited the British Museum and the London Mithraeum. Pupils explored the Rome, Roman Britain, and Parthenon galleries in the British Museum, practising their source evaluation skills, enjoying talks on classical art and growing their appreciation for the field of classics. In the Mithraeum, students explored the archaeology of Roman London, and enjoyed an immersive experience which recreated a ceremony in the temple of Mithras.

From here I went to the London regional finals at the V&A museum. I had practised tirelessly and polished my performance with the help of Ms. O'Flaherty whose insight as a drama teacher really boosted my confidence. Unfortunately, I didn't win this time, but this was a thoroughly eye-opening experience and I'm so glad Mrs Lennox applied for Mossbourne students to be given a chance to compete, and I am honoured to be the first Mossbournian to have done so.

I learnt so much about confident public speaking which I will use when preparing for future presentations. One teacher said, "It's not always about what you say, sometimes it's about how you say things", and I am still thinking about it now as I write this article!

Thank you to everyone who has helped me, including the teachers that judged and supported me and members of my art class that came to my first competitive round, I am very grateful for this experience.

Our trip to Culford Ceramics Studio on Tuesday 16th May was fabulous. When we entered, we saw lots of clay work that was colourful and creative. First, we met Liz Jackson, a ceramic artist based at the studio who was our guide and teacher throughout our visit. She showed us a huge kiln, it was so big that the studio was built around it! Then she introduced us to other artists who explained their work; one was glazing and the other was creating moulds for new work based on the sea and climate change. We also met Ella who showed us all the processes that she had gone through to create work inspired by the landscape around her home. Then Liz showed us how to wedge the clay to get the air out and how to use guide sticks to create even slabs. We used moulds that she had made to create clay fruit, vegetables biscuits and even fried eggs that we could take back to school to fire and glaze. I was really surprised by the detail in the moulds and all the different kinds of work that the artists made. I can't wait for the next amazing trip!

Reading Chinua Achebe

Students in Year 9 have been reading Chinua Achebe's classic novel Things Fall Apart, first published in 1958. Mr James' class has been looking specifically at how Achebe represents women within the novel, leading to some very insightful comments in the essays produced. Mr James was hugely impressed with the students' progress and the Mossbournian is pleased to share some extracts reflecting their ideas around how this seminal novel is written:

I think Achebe presents women throughout the novel as submissive and subservient towards their male partners. The quote 'do what you are told women' reveals the toxic masculinity, as he speaks to his wives like they are cheap replaceable objects. The imperative verb 'do' indicates that Okonkwo is commanding her to do as she is told. This is reinforced by the quote 'he ruled with a heavy hand', meaning he is in full control of his household.

I believe Achebe presents women through the microcosm of Okonkwo's behaviour towards his wives. When he 'bit his lip in anger' after one of his wives did not follow his instruction, it exemplifies male dominance over women.




COMPUTER SCIENCE

Bedford Head

Mossbourne Rowing Academy competed at the Bedford Head in February.

The notoriously twisty Bedford course requires rowers to navigate five bridges along the Great River Ouse. The bends and bridges are a challenge for boats with a cox, but even more so for coxless boats where the rower in the stroke seat steers using a

rudder cable attached to their foot. Thanks to excellent steering by our coxes and steers people, all our equipment was still in good working order at the end of the day's racing!

We also came away with five event wins, including our Year 9 Boys' crew who were competing for the first time since joining the racing squad in September.



Schools' Head of the River Race

The Schools' Head of the River Race is one of biggest annual sporting events in the UK. Over 3500 rowers compete for their schools over the 6.8km championship course on the Thames between Mortlake and Putney.

This year Mossbourne entered 49 rowers racing in six crews.

Our J16 Boys' Crew were the first down the course. After winning the J15 event last year, they were keen to hold on to their title. The crew was coxed by J15 rower Caspar, who steered a fantastic course, overtaking several crews. They finished in 3rd place overall – an exceptional result, especially as they had a last-minute substitute on board.

Next down the course were our J18 Girls' 8+. Their focus this season has been on sculling (each rower using a pair of oars), so racing in a sweep 8+ (each rower using a single oar) was a new experience. The crew, which was stroked by Inaya and coxed by Alioune, raced aggressively down the course, finishing in 17th position.

Our two J15 Boys' crews were competing on the Tideway (the tidal part of the Thames) for the first time. Our 'A' crew set off at a ferocious pace, quickly catching some of the crews in front of them. Unfortunately, they got caught in traffic which cost them valuable time. They finished in 7th place, a great result at this event. The 'B' crew also did very well, finishing in 13th place.

Our Year 12 Girls' Quad raced in the J18 event, against mostly Year 13 girls, and were our only coxless boat racing. Violet steered an amazing racing line down the notoriously hard to navigate Tideway course. They finished 28th in a very competitive division.

Last to row the course was our J15 Girls' 8+. Like the senior girls, their focus this year has been on sculling, so the sweep 8+ was a challenge. Zuilaka steered a great line along the course and the stern pair of Lena and Natalie provided a great rhythm for the rest of the crew to follow. They finished 7th overall in their category.
