Dear Parents and Carers,

Welcome to the winter edition of 'The Mossbournian'. As always, a very special welcome must go to the parents, carers and pupils in Year 7 and 12 for whom this is the first term at Mossbourne Community Academy and Sixth Form.

I would like to thank all parents and carers for your support for the academy and for the emotional security and care you give to our students at this terrible time; a time in which horrific events have, and are, taking place in the world. Thank

fellow students and adults alike. On his way to school, Rumani O'Garro Thompson (11 Malala) found a mobile phone and credit card which had been lost by a member of the public. Rumani handed the items into his Head of Year which meant we were able to reunite the owner with his lost property. Well done to Rumani, whose actions made me very proud.

As always, I must make mention of the exceptional achievements of students in Years 10, 11 and 13 last academic year. When results were released in August, the senior team immediately knew that students had achieved record results and were ecstatically happy. However, the extent of their achievements only became clear when the national picture emerged.

Our current Year 11 cohort excelled beyond predictions in their Religious Studies GCSE in the summer – huge congratulations to Year 11. Having sat the

Last year's Year 11 pupils attained outstanding GCSE results and achieved record-breaking progress. The Progress 8 measure of 1.23, achieved by last year's Year 11 pupils, demonstrates how well the pupils have risen to the challenge of a robust curriculum; it is doubly remarkable given that only 73 schools in the entire country achieved a Progress 8 measure of above 1. For schools where disadvantaged pupils account for more than 40% of the cohort, I am proud to say that Mossbourne Community Academy is ranked number two in the country. Whilst the national average for all pupils is 0, our disadvantaged pupils achieved an incredible 0.91. In other words, these pupils made nearly one more grade of progress in their GCSEs than all other pupils, nationally. An astounding 86% of pupils achieved five or more GCSEs at grades 4+, including English and maths. 64% of the cohort achieved the English Baccalaureate, which means they achieved at least a Grade

you for continuing to monitor your child's access to social media so we are sure they are safe. We are horrified at events in the Middle East and my thoughts and prayers go out to families around the world, and members of our community, who are suffering. I am proud of the sense of community and kindness that continues at Mossbourne. I am sure you will join us in reiterating the fact that we are an inclusive school in which everyone is valued and respected. I thank you for echoing at home that we are a community in which there is no tolerance of racism, antisemitism, hatred or discrimination of any kind. Staff feel strongly that it is a privilege to work with the students of Mossbourne Community Academy and both staff and students are aware of how blessed we are to enjoy the luxury of a safe and supportive environment in which to work and learn. I am sure you will join me, especially at this time of year, in extending our thoughts to all communities who are affected by what is happening and for whom peace is a luxury they do not have.

I would like to start by applauding a Year 11 pupil for his honesty and for acting in a way that models community spirit for examination a year early, in Year 10, they achieved a progress score of 1.2 – over a grade above their expected grade at the end of Year 11. Incredibly, a quarter of all grades were grade 9, two thirds of all grades were 7+ and 83% of grades were 5+. They have proven both their potential and work ethic, so I look forward to seeing them go from strength to strength over the coming year.

Mention of the exceptional achievements of students in Years 10, 11 and 13 last academic year. When results were released in August, the senior team immediately knew that students had achieved record results and were ecstatically happy. However, the extent of their achievements only became clear when the national picture emerged.

5 in English, maths, the sciences, a language and either history or geography.

Once again, our Year 13 students achieved incredible A-level results. An impressive 80% of all grades achieved were a grade B, or better, and 48% of all grades were A\*- A; this figure exceeds the average number of A\*-A grades achieved in the private sector (47%). Whilst 16pupils were successful in securing places at Oxbridge, eight pupils have embarked on degrees in medicine or veterinary science and three students secured places to study architecture. We are especially proud of Ayodimeji Olawaiye who secured an elite apprenticeship in software engineering with Jaguar Land Rover, Enoch Bedzo-Nutakor who triumphed over stiff competition to win a place with Bloomberg to undertake an apprenticeship in finance, and Hevin Coban who secured an apprenticeship with the Metropolitan Police. An astounding 62% of students from last year's Year 13 are now studying at a Russell Group university.

A plethora of special events and trips have already taken place since September;

below I capture just a few of the many events which have been squeezed into a busy term. Enrichment Weeks have taken place in PE and modern foreign languages, giving pupils the chance to enjoy extending their learning of these subjects outside of the curriculum. In early November, at the culmination of Languages Week, the Dining Hall was abuzz with both Spanish music and the demand for paella and churros. Thank you to Ms Phillips and Sam, our Head Cook, who made it possible. PE Enrichment Week culminated in the inaugural Sports Award Evening which saw our dedicated athletes in Years 7-11 enjoy music, trophies, nibbles and celebrations. The support and cheers given by the audience to the winners was wonderful and, Mr Cameron, I am already looking forward to the Sports Awards in 2024. Earlier in the term, two Year 12 historians had the opportunity to visit Auschwitz, an experience which had a profound impact on them and provided memories which will last a lifetime. A special thank you to Miss Vock-Betton for supporting the trip. Our 'Success for our Black Boys Group' has been hugely lucky to enjoy and learn from workshops delivered by an abundance of talented, driven and successful figures from various industries, including Leon Mann (sports agent and journalist), Jonzi D (Dance Director for Breaking Convention and Sadlers Wells Theatre), Emmillio (a motivational speaker and life coach) and Kiblah Ahmed (illustrator and film commentator with DC Comics and Films). A special thank you to Mr Edwards for organising the workshops with the help of an impressive network of friends and contacts.

I would also like to take this opportunity to say a very special thank you to the Friends of Mossbourne Community Academy (FoMCA). Without the unstinting support of FoMCA it would not be possible to hold the Pre-Loved Uniform Stall at parents' evenings. FoMCA sort, tidy and sell the uniform and it is a worthy cause both during the cost-of-living crisis and in light of the importance of recycling. If I may make a direct plea to parents: if you have ever purchased an item from the Pre-Loved Uniform Stall please do consider supporting FoMCA. 




#### Proposal by **Violet Humphreys** (13Berkoff) and **Isabella Yesufu** (13 Kingsley):

#### MCA Medicine Bursary Update

Clinical skills practice is an important part of what the Medicine Bursary offers.

Mossbourne's Medicine Bursary Programme goes from strength to strength with University College London Laboratories visiting to talk to students in Years 7,8, 10 and 11. Meanwhile, the new cohort of NHS Cadets in Year 9 are well under-way with their annual programme.

This year we have 23 Year 13 students applying for medicine, dentistry and veterinary studies. Our team of over 30 medical students, doctors, dentists and vets have been putting them through their paces in terms of interview practice to get them ready for their big days ahead.

Meanwhile our new cohort of Year 12 students have worked through the first half of their speaker and activity programme. Speakers this year include geriatrician Sophie Edwards, HIV specialist Patrick French, dentist Dayan Charles, Sunday Times Health Editor Shaun Lintern and Homerton CEO Louise Ashley. Students have produced posters on research topics and practiced clinical skills like suturing. Students are looking forward to a trip to the Imperial Simulation Suite in early 2024 where they will undertake clinical practice in an environment that is usually reserved for medical students and junior doctors.

# Vellum Book Signing at the Honourable Artillery Company

The Honourable Artillery Company (HAC) was established by Royal Charter in 1537. Since 1964 it has been registered as a charity. In 2018 they sponsored the creation of the Combined Cadet Force at Mossbourne. The CCF celebrated its five-year anniversary in September 2023, by hosting Formation Day at the HAC, in Armoury House. The Mossbourne cadets had their annual inspection, followed by several award presentations and promotions. One of the highlights of the event was the cadets having the honour of signing the historic HAC Vellum Book. The original Ancient Vellum Book is a composite volume which includes lists of those admitted to the company from 1611 onwards. Still to this day, on admission to the Company, new members enter their names into large vellum-bound membership books. It was an incredible opportunity for the cadets to take part in this historic tradition at the HAC. The event was attended by 49 cadets, their parents and military dignitaries.



# Work Experience at Norton Rose Fulbright

The Mossbourne Sixth Form is very privileged to have Norton Rose Fulbright as a link firm. Already, distinguished Mossbourne Alumni have managed to secure places at this law firm through our work experience, so being able to send four of our most talented students from diverse backgrounds to a firm of this standard, is an opportunity that we are very grateful to have. Our students learnt about the inner workings of a global law firm, having introductions to both the legal and business side of the firm. They were also given the chance to network with esteemed in-house and private practice lawyers, who mentored them one-to-one by doing CV workshops and mock interviews. They ended their week at Norton Rose Fulbright by getting into teams and presenting legal advice to a panel of experienced lawyers. We're very proud to say that Mia Arthur's group won the presentation. When we asked her what she learnt about her time at Norton Rose Fulbright, she said:

It was truly an eye-opening experience. I got to meet so many interesting people and I really felt I gained an insight into the different avenues of corporate law. Everybody at the firm was friendly and supportive, and I learnt so much more about how I could improve my personal brand and make myself a more competitive candidate. I am very grateful for this opportunity!

#### Summer Schools

During the summer holiday, several of our current Year 13 students attended summer schools at various universities. University summer schools are a great opportunity to deepen subject knowledge while getting a taster of university life:

I attended the K+ programme at Kings' College London. During this time, I worked in a group of people from a range of schools, and we attended lectures on campus. These lectures were in preparation for the university-style essay we were to complete in order to determine whether we would receive a two-grade reduced offer for the university. I gained information from interesting lectures on the environment in many different countries and the effects of environmental issues on habitats, climates and animals. While attending these lectures we also had workshops on things such as personal statements and university life. During the four-day K+ summer school we had lectures by professors at King's College London. I had lectures on environmental sciences and throughout the day we had other sessions, for example about mental health and what it is like to be at university and studying at King's. At the end of the summer school we wrote an essay on a topic related to the lectures, which were graded, to unlock the K+ grade reductions. I enjoyed receiving feedback from the professors. It was very beneficial as now I can improve my essay style before starting university and already have an idea of what it is like to write essays by a certain deadline and how to reference to a university standard. **Tabassum Noshin** (13 Hazlitt)

Laila Yakubu (13 Wollstonecraft) participated in both the Sutton Trust US Schools Programme and the Eton College University Preparation Programme:

Being on The Sutton Trust US Programme has been an incredible experience. I and 150 other students from state schools across the UK were flown to the USA in July and my group stayed in dorms at Princeton University. During the week, we toured colleges including Harvard University, University of Pennsylvania, and Bryn Mawr College. We also indulged in cultural activities such as going to a baseball game. At the end of the week, we networked with US admissions officers from over 20 colleges. This free programme is a life-changing opportunity regardless of whether you choose to apply to a US university in Year 13 or not!

I also really enjoyed The Eton College University Preparation Programme. It is a great opportunity to dig deeper into a specific subject with academic tutors and peers. I took part in a three-day "Poetry Through the Ages" course. This course greatly improved my analysis of poetry for studying English Literature and having conversations about poetry with my peers and the tutors was very insightful. On a non-academic note, this summer school is also a great opportunity to explore the lovely town of Windsor.

This programme gave me insight beyond the A-level curriculum and also solidified my foundational mathematics. I enjoyed meeting new students and this provided me with some useful perspective on preparing for university. Sessions with specialists about subjects I wouldn't normally study were particularly interesting.'

#### As did Lena Kesraoui (13 Wollstonecraft):

Studying biology with chemistry at Eton College during the summer holidays gave me an opportunity to expand on my existing knowledge of biochemistry by going into greater depth on topics and then extending my understanding of their useful applications in science. For instance, we delved deeper into insect structures and then applied this in a forensic entomology case (using the insects to determine time of death). I especially enjoyed making paracetamol in the labs. Not only were we able to test the purity of our final product by using a mass spectrometer in person, but we were also able to discuss how paracetamol works in relieving symptoms. I found this especially interesting as I am applying to study medicine!

Mia Arthur (13 Morley) attended two summer residentials; Pembroke College Arts and Humanities Residential and the Sutton Trust Pathways to Law Residential at Warwick University:

My time at Pembroke was both insightful and enjoyable. I attended lectures on topics ranging from law, to art history and education. However, the most enjoyable parts about my stay was my time exploring the amazing facilities, making brilliant new friends and attending a mock Formal Hall.

I also spent a week at Warwick University as part of the Sutton Trust Pathways programme. I met Pathways students from across Britain and attended lectures, debate sessions and motivational speeches. I enjoyed my time at Warwick so much that I applied there for university, and I'm pleased to announce that I've now received an offer!

I volunteered for two weeks in a primary school in Accra, Ghana. During this time, my team and I built a canteen for the children to eat inside as they were previously eating in unsanitary conditions. I was also able to spend time with the children and do several activities in the classroom, such as teaching English and painting. Additionally, I participated in extra-curricular activities like arts ⊕ craft and volleyball. I was able to have multiple one-to-one sessions where I spoke to the kids about their mental and physical health and how they can look after themselves. This experience was humbling and made me more appreciative of my surroundings. The volunteering opportunity was eyeopening, and I would strongly advise other people to apply for this scholarship.

I had the opportunity to travel to Costa Rica and work with children aged from 3 months to 12 years old. My tasks included creating visual learning aides on their display area, such as posters and alphabet charts. We then engaged in informal English lessons in the form of repetition drills, where I would say a phrase and the children would repeat. This was my favourite exercise, as I noticed it was effective in improving



their recollection of everyday expressions, and they really enjoyed learning together as a group. My best memory is taking part in the 'Fiesta de las fresas' which is a tradition where communities gather and throw fresh strawberries at each other, celebrating the strawberry harvest. 






# Musical Truth - an inspiring session with Jeffrey Boakye
